ARIZONA WATER BANKING AUTHORITY Draft Minutes¹

June 16, 2010 Arizona Department of Water Resources

Welcome/Opening Remarks

Chairman Herb Guenther welcomed the attendees. All members of the Authority were present except for *ex-officio* members, Senator Steve Pierce and Representative Kirk Adams.

Chairman Guenther noted an error on a previous agenda for the December AWBA Commission meeting. The correct date is Wednesday, December 8th.

Approval of Minutes

The Authority approved the minutes of the March 17, 2010 meeting.

Staff Activities

Ms. O'Connell reviewed water deliveries for 2010 noting they were moving along as scheduled. Deliveries in the Phoenix and Pinal Active Management Areas (AMAs) are picking up and Tucson AMA deliveries are ahead of schedule. She also reviewed the recovery schedule for developing Intentionally Created Unused Apportionment (ICUA) for the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (Metropolitan). CAWCD has scheduled the recovery of 8,159 acre-feet of water for 2010. Less than half of those credits remain to be recovered. Once recovered, the obligation to Metropolitan will be met.

Ms. O'Connell briefed the Commission on the *ad valorem* tax resolution for water storage that was adopted by CAWCD Board of Directors at their June 3rd meeting. The *ad valorem* tax will be levied on behalf of CAWCD at a rate of 4-cents per \$100 of assessed value on all taxable property within the 3-county service area. Funds collected will be deposited into a District Fund and used to defray annual operation, maintenance, and replacement costs, which includes offsetting the AWBA's water delivery charges for water storage. In previous years, the resolution was more specific in that it further described the use of funds for O&M and replacement costs associated with underground storage. The language in this year's resolution is less specific so that the funds could potentially be used for other purposes. Other expenditures would first be identified through a stakeholder process. Commission members directed staff to participate in that process since Indian firming had been discussed as a potential use for the funds.

Kim Mitchell informed the Commission that the AWBA certified the development of 27,504 acre-feet of ICUA for Metropolitan in 2009. This is the third year ICUA has been

certified. ICUA was created through the recovery of long-term storage credits from wells in the three Pinal AMA irrigation districts.

Ms. Mitchell also provided an update on water supply acquisition activities noting that the water supply report prepared by Tom Carr would be provided to Commission members the following week. She recommended a workshop early September before the next AWBA regular meeting scheduled for September 15th. The tentative date for the workshop is September 1st.

Gregg Houtz briefed the Commission on the AWBA's legislative amendment. Senate Bill 1356 passed in both the Senate and the House and was signed by the Governor on April 26th. The amendment clarifies the AWBA's ability to participate in excess water pools created by CAWCD for AWBA purposes.

Mr. Houtz provided an update on Indian settlements. Senate Bill 313, the White Mountain Apache Tribe (WMAT) Water Rights Quantification Act is awaiting passage in the Senate. The Bill may not be enacted this year. Negotiations on the Navajo Nation/ Hopi Tribe settlement remain ongoing and are focused on the exhibits to the agreement. John Mawhinney inquired if that settlement was the last. Mr. Houtz responded that there were several other Indian tribes identified for future settlements, but the amount of water under consideration was significantly lower.

Mr. Houtz also provided an update on CAWCD v. Brewer, the litigation regarding the legislative transfer of funds from the Nevada Resource subaccount. The AWBA is not a party in the lawsuit.

Legislative Transfers from the Arizona Water Banking Fund

Ms. Mitchell informed the Commission that HB 2001 had been signed by Governor Brewer on March 18, 2010. The Bill required the transfer of \$5 million from the interstate subaccount and \$198,200 from other subaccounts in the Arizona Water Banking Fund (AWB Fund) by April 15th for fiscal year (FY) 2010 and an additional \$455,800 in transfers from the AWB Fund for FY 2011 by July 15th. As directed by Commission members at the March meeting, \$198,200 was transferred from the Phoenix AMA subaccount. With regard to the \$5 million, staff informed the Government Accounting Office (GAO) that the Nevada Resource subaccount only had a balance of \$4,698,345.40; therefore the full \$5 million was not available for transfer. Staff had clarified to the GAO that the only disbursements from this subaccount since September 2007 had been for legislative transfers. In response, staff was informed that provisions under HB 2001 required that the \$5 million be made available and that the difference of \$301,654.60 would be transferred from the AWB Fund by June 30th.

Commission members had previously directed staff to provide information on alternatives for the remaining transfers. Section 1 of the paper provided included two alternatives for the FY 2011 transfers of \$455,800. Alternative 1A (staff recommendation) distributes the transfer proportionally among the Phoenix, Pinal and Tucson AMA withdrawal fee subaccounts, thus reducing the amount of water that could be purchased with these funds. Because there are sufficient funds available in the Maricopa and Pima County *ad valorem* tax accounts, water deliveries to the Phoenix and Tucson AMAs would not be affected. However because there are no additional

funds available in the Pinal County ad valorem tax account, water deliveries scheduled for the Pinal AMA under the 2010 Plan of Operation (Plan) would be reduced by 1,960 acre-feet. Alternative (1B) transfers the total amount from the Phoenix AMA subaccount. This alternative would not impact water deliveries scheduled under the 2010 Plan, but would place the full burden on the Phoenix AMA. Mr. Mawhinney inquired if Alternative 1A would affect efforts to meet the Tucson AMA M&I firming goal. Ms. O'Connell responded that while deliveries to the Tucson AMA would not be impacted this year, it would reduce the amount of water that could be stored the following year. Commission members favored Alternative 1A, but were concerned about the impacts to the Pinal AMA. They discussed the possibility of delivering interstate water, if and when available, to compensate for the reduction in deliveries. Steve Olson (AMWUA) supported Alternative 1A, noting the burden should be shared among the AMAs. Joe Singleton (Pinal County Water Augmentation Authority) also agreed with Commission members, but pointed out that although the share is proportional it is not necessarily equitable because the Pinal AMA is the only AMA that would suffer a reduction in deliveries. He noted that the Pinal AMA would appreciate delivery of interstate water if it should become available later in the year. Tom Buschatzke commented he preferred keeping the Pinal AMA whole and suggested a third alternative where the Pinal AMA's share is absorbed by the Phoenix AMA. He and Mr. Mawhinney commented they would prefer to store interstate water in the Phoenix and Tucson AMAs. Larry Dozier (CAWCD) pointed out that the Pinal AMA could also be kept whole through storage by other entities.

Mr. Buschatzke made a motion that the AWBA fullfill its requirement to transfer \$455,800 by taking \$63,800 from the Tucson AMA withdrawal fee subaccount and the remainder of \$392,000 from the Phoenix AMA withdrawal fee subaccount. Maureen George provided the second to that motion. The motion carried.

Section 2 of the paper included three alternatives for the transfer of \$301,654.60, which is the balance remaining on the \$5 million transfer. Alternative 2A (staff recommendation) transfers the funds from the Nevada Resource subaccount, which were made available the end of April as a result of CAWCD's reconciliation of 2009 interstate water delivery costs. Alternative 2B would transfer the funds proportionally from the withdrawal fee subaccount for the three AMAs and Alternative 2C would transfer the total amount from the Phoenix AMA withdrawal fee subaccount. Mr. Buschatzke commented that because HB 2001specifically identifies the transfer of \$5 million from the interstate subaccount, he did not believe Alternatives 2B and 2C would be allowable.

Lisa Atkins made a motion that staff request from CAWCD \$301,654.60 made available through the reconciliation of 2009 interstate deliveries and to deposit that amount in the NV Resource subaccount to meet the balance of the required legislative transfer for FY 2010 pursuant to HB 2001. Ms. George provided the second to that motion. The motion carried.

2009 Annual Report

Ms. Mitchell provided a brief overview of the AWBA's activities for 2009, including progress made toward meeting goals and obligations. Approximately 3.3 million acrefeet of long-term storage credits have been accrued through 2009.

Ms. O'Connell reviewed the components of the Ten-Year Plan (Plan) for 2011-2020, which included projections for water availability, storage capacity, and funding resources. She noted that storage capacity should be sufficient given the amount of water available to the AWBA. However, because of an increase in water storage permits issued for CAWCD's underground storage facilities, the location of AWBA storage could be affected in the future. Mr. Buschatzke commented that the CAWCD Board had discussions at its last meeting on prioritizing storage capacity at its facilities, which it refered to sub-committee for further analysis. He suggested staff participate in that process.

Ms. O'Connell pointed out that the Plan assumed normal year deliveries although there is a 1-in-4 chance of shortage at the end of ten years. While the probability is low, there are shortages identified as early as 2012. This could affect on-river M&I water users and non-Indian agricultural water deliveries, thus triggering the need for recovery. She noted the next year's Plan will include additional evaluation of recovery and impacts of shortages.

Ms. O'Connell discussed the percent of goals that could be achieved under the Plan. She noted the Plan shows there may not be sufficient water available to the AWBA to meet the obligation to Nevada. Staff had been directed to pursue opportunities with CAWCD to acquire additional supplies for this purpose. In addition, funding continues to be a limitation in the Tucson AMA, which affects the ability to meet the firming goal. Lastly, absent other general fund appropriations, withdrawal fees are the principle source of funding for Indian firming. Chairman Guenther inquired if the Indian firming obligation could be met utilizing withdrawal fees. Ms. O'Connell responded that the estimated firming obligation could be met with future and existing credits accrued with withdrawal fees from the Phoenix and Pinal AMAs. However, it is possible the actual obligation could be higher than estimated. She clarified that credits accrued utilizing withdrawal fees can be used for other water management purposes. As more credits are needed for Indian firming, the amount available for other uses is reduced. Mr. Buschatzke commented that the water community has been addressing the potential impacts of climate change in their planning activities and suggested that M&I firming goals be amended to include the affects of climate change as well. He noted the firming goal could be identified as a range rather than a specific target.

Mr. Mawhinney made a motion to approve the 2009 Annual Report and Ten-Year Plan and to direct staff to submit the report to the Governor, Speaker of the House, and President of the Senate, pursuant to statute. Mr. Buschatzke provided the second to that motion. The motion carried.

FY 2011 Administrative Budget

Ms. Mitchell briefed Commission members on actual expenditures for FY 2010, which were less than estimated because expenditures for professional and outside services and travel were under budget. She noted that the proposed FY 2011 Administrative Budget is approximately \$537,000. Expenditures for personnel services are less than the previous fiscal year because they reflect a five percent cut in pay; resultant employee related expenditures are also less. The cost of services include the addition of a half-time accountant position. Ms. Mitchell clarified that administrative costs are

paid from the administration subaccount. While not a requirement, revenue for this subbaccount has historically come from interest accrued on other subaccounts in the AWB Fund. In past years there were sufficient funds in those subaccounts to generate enough interest to support the administrative budget. However, based on the current balance and anticipated interest earnings, it will not be sufficient to meet budget expenditures for FY 2011. Therefore, \$120,131 will be transferred from within the AWB Fund to the administration subaccount to meet costs.

Lisa Atkins made a motion to adopt the FY 2011 Administrative Budget. Mr. Mawhinney provided the second to that motion. The motion carried.

Interstate Water Banking

Ms. Mitchell commented that at the last meeting, Chairman Guenther had been authorized to sign the Recovery Agreement among AWBA, CAWCD, Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA), and Colorado River Commission of Nevada. The agreement has since been fully executed. She noted that staff has also had discussions with SNWA concerning adjustments to the interstate payment schedule. The parties have resolved issues and are in the process of obtaining a formal agreement.

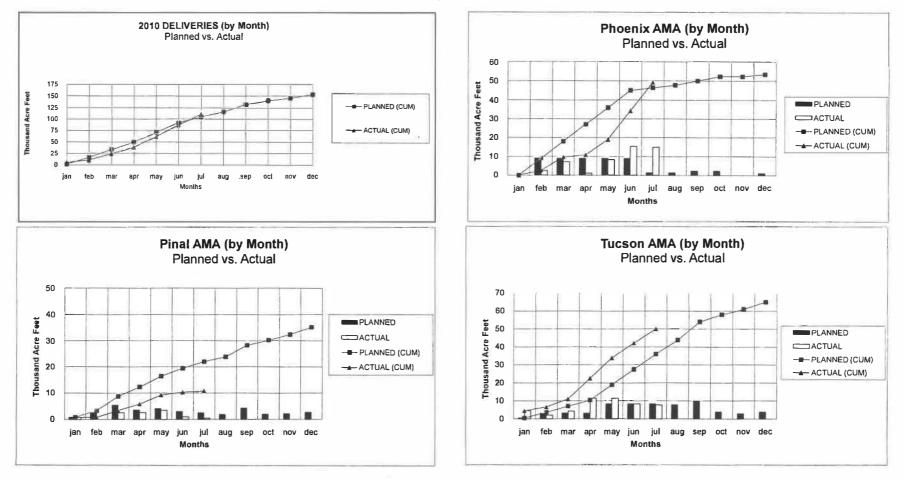
Ms. Mitchell reviewed the second quarter interstate accounting table for 2010. Through 2009, the AWBA has accrued 582,772 acre-feet of credits, which represents 47 percent of the obligation to Nevada. The 2010 Plan does not include storage on behalf of Nevada. The table also identifies legislative transfers from the Resource subaccount, including the estimated \$300,000 that will be transferred based on direction provided in the earlier discussions on the transfer of the \$5 million. These funds are from reconciliation monies that are currently held at CAWCD. Funds remaining in the Operating subaccount are also available from the reconciliation of both water deliveries and rate adjustments.

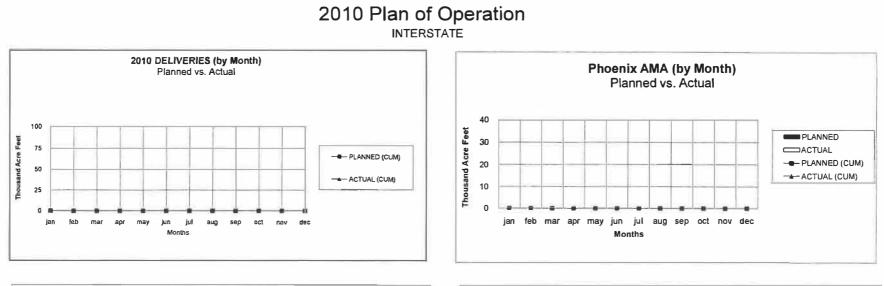

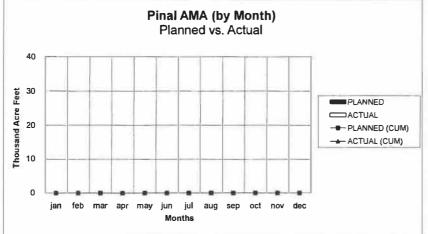

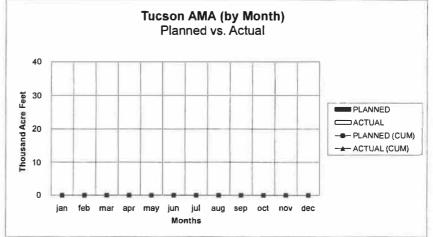

RECOVERY OF STORED CAP WATER FOR M&I SUBCONTRACTORS

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Draft: August 23, 2010

CAGRD'S ROLE IN RECOVERY

To minimize impacts of a Colorado River shortage on CAP subcontractors, CAWCD will make deliveries to CAGRD through credit exchange to the maximum extent possible, thereby leaving as much "wet" water in the system as possible for direct delivery.

MONITORING AND ADVANCE NOTICE OF POTENTIAL SHORTAGE

CAWCD will monitor the outlook of Colorado River water supplies on an ongoing basis, working in concert with the USBR and other water management entities. CAWCD will provide its M&I Subcontractors with as much advance notice as possible of a potential Colorado River shortage declaration and provide updates as conditions change.

M&I DELIVERIES THROUGH 2026

CAWCD can meet all M&I Subcontract orders through 2026 during the interim shortage sharing guidelines*, under all projected shortage scenarios with available CAP water and recovery of credits.

*The Colorado River Interim Guidelines for Lower Basin Shortages and the Coordinated Operations for Lake Powell and Lake Mead

COLLABORATION IN PLANNING AND SCHEDULING CAP WATER IN A SHORTAGE YEAR

CAWCD will collaborate with the M&I Subcontractors in planning and scheduling orders during shortages on the Colorado River mainstream to optimize use of available Colorado River water and stored credits to fulfill all delivery requests to the greatest extent possible. CAWCD will consider the M&I Subcontractors' water operations in planning deliveries.

GOALS FOR RECOVERY

CAWCD'S goal will be to minimize disruptions to its M&I Subcontractors' use of their CAP subcontract entitlement during Colorado River shortages. This will be accomplished through three methods of recovery: direct, indirect and credit exchange.

RECOVERY THROUGH CREDIT EXCHANGE USING CREDITS STORED AT THAT SAME UNDERGROUND STORAGE FACILITY

CAWCD may meet a subcontractor's order for water delivery to an underground storage facility (USF) by transferring credits already stored at that facility unless the subcontractor agrees to accept credits accrued at a different facility. In addition, CAWCD will not require a credit exchange if the subcontractor needs wet water to be delivered to the USF for operational purposes.

INDIRECT RECOVERY WITH WILLING PARTNERS ONLY

CAWCD will accomplish indirect recovery by identifying willing partners, entering into contractual arrangements, and providing only those credits that are acceptable to the partner.

DEVELOPMENT OF FACILITIES FOR DIRECT RECOVERY

CAWCD will develop direct recovery facilities as necessary to achieve the goal of minimizing disruptions to its M&I Subcontractors' use of their CAP subcontract entitlement during Colorado River shortages

PLANNING FOR FUTURE RECOVERY

CAWCD will work with AWBA and the M&I Subcontractors in planning future AWBA storage and in strategically relocating existing credits to optimize future recovery. In doing so, CAWCD will always recognize facility ownership and develop all agreements necessary to accomplish the relocation.

Interstate Water Banking Report Requirement

Section 2473 to Title 45, Chapter 14, Article 4 directs the Arizona Water Banking Authority (AWBA) to submit a report about interstate water banking to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee on or before October 1 of each year for the previous fiscal year. This report contains information for fiscal year 2010.

The report requires an accounting report of the AWBA's interstate water banking activities with the State of Nevada, including the Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA), and includes the following:

- 1. An accounting of all monies received through the Interstate Water Banking Agreement (Agreement) with the (SNWA).
- 2. An accounting of all disbursements made with interstate monies, including monies used to purchase or store water.
- 3. An accounting of any prepaid monies to the Central Arizona Water Conservation District (CAWCD).
- 4. An accounting of any monies received under the Agreement that are placed in an account with the State Treasurer.
- 5. Any contract that obligates the AWBA to pay or disburse monies to any other entity, including the CAWCD.

Section 2473 directs that the AWBA may only use the monies received pursuant to an interstate water banking agreement to pay the costs directly incurred in meeting the interstate water banking obligations.

BACKGROUND

The "Law of the River" is comprised of federal and state statutes, interstate compacts, court decisions and decrees, contracts with the United States, an international treaty, operating criteria and administrative decisions concerning the Colorado River. Together, these have resulted in a division of the waters of the Colorado River among the various states and their water users. Over the past several years, the seven states that utilize the Colorado River (the Basin states) have had discussions over various issues and the majority of the issues have been resolved via negotiation instead of litigation. Currently, the issue facing the Basin states is drought and the potential impact to river operations and water supply. Because Arizona is the most junior user on the river, it is important for the state to take steps to protect the Colorado River water supply for Arizona water users.

The 2006 U.S. Supreme Court Consolidated Decree in *Arizona v. California*, confirmed the allocation of water to the three states of the Lower Colorado River basin. This allocation is 4.4 million acre-feet (maf) to California, 2.8 maf to Arizona and 300,000 acre-feet to Nevada.

Agreement for Interstate Water Banking

On July 3, 2001, the Agreement for Interstate Water Banking (2001 Agreement) among the AWBA, the Southern Nevada Water Authority (SNWA) and the Colorado River Commission of Nevada (CRCN) was executed¹. In the 2001 Agreement, the AWBA agreed to use its "best efforts" to store water in Arizona in an amount sufficient to develop an aggregate total of 1.25 million acre-feet of long-term storage credits. Those credits would then be recovered to develop Intentionally Created Unused Apportionment (ICUA) for Nevada as a temporary supply of water to allow Nevada time to develop other long-term water supplies. The 2001 Agreement contained specific provisions to insure that any water stored for Nevada was water that could not be utilized by water users in Arizona. Nevada would pay the full cost of water delivery and storage in addition to all costs associated with recovery of the long-term storage credits.

In 2004, Nevada began exploring alternative ways to meet their water supply needs and approached Arizona with a proposal to amend the 2001 Agreement in such a manner that Nevada's water supply could be made more secure in the shorter term. The AWBA began negotiations regarding amendments to the original agreement with SNWA and CAWCD staff.

Amended Agreement for Interstate Water Banking

The intent of the amendments was to assure Nevada access to the full 1.25 million acre-feet anticipated under the 2001 Agreement. For this access, Nevada would continue to bear the full cost of storing excess CAP water and later recovering that water. Nevada would also provide \$100 million to the State of Arizona to ensure that Arizona could acquire additional water resources if conditions warranted.

In summary, the amendments negotiated were as follows: (1) guaranteed Nevada a total of 1.25 million acre-feet of credits; (2) recognized that water other than Colorado River water may be the source of credits; (3) Nevada would pay the full cost of delivery, storage and recovery in addition

to the \$100 million to mitigate the risk of the guarantee; (4) identified a set schedule for recovery of long-term storage credits; and (5) a sufficient supply of credits would be recovered to allow Nevada to use up to 340,000 acre-feet during a declared shortage on the Colorado River. The Amended Agreement for Interstate Water Banking (Amended Agreement) was approved by the AWBA Commission on December 9, 2004 and executed on February 3, 2005.

The two most significant provisions of the Amended Agreement are that Arizona has now guaranteed Nevada that a sum total of 1.25 million acre-feet of credits will be developed on their behalf. In exchange for this guarantee, Nevada agreed to pay Arizona \$100 million above the actual cost of water delivery and storage. The initial \$100 million dollar payment was made in two installments in 2005, and deposited in a Resource Account of the AWBA Fund.

The AWBA began storing water pursuant to the Amended Agreement in 2005, under a provision recognizing that the AWBA may store water on behalf of SNWA prior to the commencement of scheduled payments, using a loan from the Resource Account. The Annual Report published by the AWBA in July of each year, for the previous calendar year, details the amount of interstate water stored and long-term storage credits accrued by the AWBA. The Amended Agreement provides a temporary water supply for Nevada allowing time for development of other non-Colorado River resources and it provides Arizona additional flexibility to achieve its long-term water management goals.

The loans from the Resource Account, have allowed the AWBA to take advantage of the available water supply and store water on Nevada's behalf. Credits accrued by Nevada through the end of calendar year 2009 totaled 582,772 acre-feet (AWBA Annual Report 2009, Table 4). In January, 2009, the AWBA held a special meeting in response to a request from SNWA for the opportunity to discuss potential changes to the Amended Agreement. The type of modifications discussed focused on creating flexibility in the interstate operations and included allowing changes to the schedule dates and period, dates of water recovery, and coordination schedules in forecasting water storage and recovery. The AWBA agreed that conditions had changed since the Amended Agreement was executed and agreed to toll the performance dates for a period of 90 days to allow time for both state parties to work on permanent modifications to the Amended Agreement.

Second Amended Agreement for Interstate Water Banking

On April 1, 2009, the AWBA approved and executed the Second Amended Agreement for Interstate Water Banking (Second Amended Agreement; Interstate Agreement). While the Second Amended Agreement does provide flexibility in administering the contract, it did not change provisions requiring Nevada to pay the full cost of storage and recovery or Arizona's obligation to create 1.25 million acre-feet of long-term storage credits.

Pursuant to a letter agreement executed April 2, 2009 between the AWBA and SNWA that approved a modification to the payment schedule, the AWBA requested in August, 2009, a partial payment from Nevada to the Operating Account of \$2,685,000 to pay the cost of delivery and storage of interstate water.

At a Special AWBA meeting in November, 2009, the AWBA Annual Plan of Operation (Plan) for 2009 was amended in response to a letter dated November 4, 2009, from the Southern Nevada Water Authority notifying the AWBA of the release of Nevada's unused apportionment for storage in Arizona. The AWBA requested a partial payment from Nevada to the Operating Account of \$10,000,000 to pay the cost of delivery and storage of these new water supplies.

By the end of calendar year 2009, AWBA delivered for storage 59,024 acre-feet of interstate water on behalf of Nevada. The AWBA Annual Plan for 2010 approved in December, 2009 did not include storing water for Nevada because of limited water availability to the AWBA as a result of high water demand in Arizona. No interstate water was delivered in the first half of calendar year 2010.

Additional interstate water supplies may be available for storage by the AWBA toward the end of calendar year 2010. The AWBA will have an estimated, cumulative total of 600,442 acre-feet of credits stored on behalf of Nevada by the end of calendar year 2010. These credits amount to about 48% of the total 1.25 million acre-feet of water storage guaranteed to Nevada. Although this interstate report is based on fiscal year accounting, the AWBA operates on a calendar year. The AWBA approves a Plan of Operation for the entire year through the end of 2010; thus, the credits are estimated through the end of 2010.

Benefits to Arizona

Our Interstate Agreement with Nevada provides an opportunity for the State of Arizona to secure numerous benefits for Arizona water users. Current projections indicate excess water within Arizona's 2.8 million acre-foot entitlement will be available for storage in the future. Without interstate banking, the AWBA does not have sufficient in-state funding to store the quantities of excess CAP water currently projected to be available. Interstate water banking is a mechanism that can maximize Arizona's utilization of its 2.8 million acre-foot entitlement.

The Interstate Agreement also provides additional financial resources that could be used to develop alternative water supplies. Additionally, water stored for interstate purposes provides revenues for the Arizona Water Protection Fund, which is the sole state funding source for riparian protection in Arizona. Furthermore, the water that Nevada may recover has and will help facilitate the full development of recovery arrangements for Arizona water users. Most importantly, the Interstate Agreement helps strengthen Arizona's interstate relationship with Nevada. A strong relationship is critical as the seven Basin states continue discussions regarding the drought and shortages on the Colorado River.

INTERSTATE ACCOUNTING

Pursuant to the Second Amended Agreement, funds are to be received by the AWBA from the SNWA in two ways:

- \$100 million will be used to guarantee that AWBA can meet the terms of the Interstate Agreement. This amount is intended to be the "insurance" payment to be used to develop alternative water resources to meet obligations to Nevada. Any alternative water supplies developed under the Second Interstate Agreement that are not needed to meet the Nevada obligation would be available for Arizona water users. This payment was made upon request in two installments in June, 2005 and October, 2005 and deposited into a "Resource Account". If the \$100 million is not needed as "insurance" then it continues to be available to Arizona for whatever purpose deemed appropriate.
- 2. \$230 million was scheduled to be paid in 10 annual payments of \$23 million beginning in 2009 and deposited into an "Operating Account". Money in the Operating Account will be used to pay CAWCD for the cost of water delivery and to pay facility operators for storage. The Second Amended Agreement now recognizes additional flexibility in operations. The AWBA and SNWA executed a letter agreement on June 15, 2010 approving a modification to the payment schedule for 2010 and 2011 given the availability of excess CAP water and economic conditions.

The total quantity of interstate storage is dynamic from year to year, but cannot exceed a quantity that would result in more than 200,000 acre-feet of long-term storage credits in any year pursuant to the Storage and Interstate Release Agreement (SIRA) among the Secretary of the Interior, the AWBA, the SNWA and CRCN. As stated above, \$100 million was received from Nevada in two installments in 2005 and deposited in a subaccount with the Arizona State Treasury. In fiscal year 2010, the AWBA received \$12,685,000 from SNWA for the delivery and storage of water pursuant to the Interstate Agreement.

On July 1, 2009, Governor Brewer signed into law SB 1188 and HB 2643¹ ("Trailer bill making revisions to SB 1188) that addressed budget reductions and transfers for FY 2009-10. The total legislative transfer from the Arizona Water Banking Fund was \$9.4 million. As a result of these bills, \$5.4 million of the total reduction was transferred from the Nevada Resource Account.

On December 23, 2009, Governor Brewer signed into law SB 1001² that addressed budget reductions and additional transfers for FY 2009-10 and transferred another \$684,700 from the Arizona Water Banking Fund. Following direction from Commission members, these monies were transferred from the Nevada Resource Account.

On March 18, 2010, Governor Brewer signed into law HB 2001 that addressed budget reductions and further transfers for FYs 2009-10 and 2010-11. The total legislative transfer from the Arizona Water Banking Fund was \$5.65¹ million. As a result of HB 2001, \$5 million of the total reduction was transferred from the Nevada Resource Account (see Interstate Accounting FY 2010 table).

Approximately \$47.9 million has been legislatively transferred from the Arizona Water Banking Fund from inception through calendar year 2010 as presently identified. Of this, \$19,649,616 has been transferred from the Nevada Resource Account.

It is important to note that although this report is based on fiscal year accounting, the AWBA operates on a calendar year. A.R.S. § 45-2456 requires by January 1 of each year, the AWBA shall adopt a Plan of Operation for that calendar year. Along with adoption of the annual Plan of Operation, funds are committed for the purchase, delivery, and storage of water for that calendar year.
